Wednesday, October 9 (Baltimore): The UMBC Poll surveyed 1,003 Maryland adults from Monday, September 23 to Saturday, September 28, 2024. Of the 1,003 Maryland adults surveyed (MOE= \pm 3.1%), 917 indicated they were registered voters (MOE= \pm 3.2%), and 863 were identified as likely voters (MOE= \pm 3.3%) in the upcoming General Election this November. Likely Voters

The 917 Maryland adults who indicated they were registered to vote in the state were asked about their intentions to vote in the November 2024 General Election for president, U.S. Senate, and other offices.

- **1 percent** say that they don't think they will vote
- **4 percent** say that the chances are 50-50 that they will vote
- **8 percent** say that they are very likely to vote
- **86 percent** say that they are absolutely certain to vote

The 863 registered voters who indicated they were "very likely" or "absolutely certain" to vote are considered "likely voters."

Enthusiasm and Method of Voting

Sixty-nine percent of Maryland likely voters are "very" enthusiastic about voting in the elections in November 2024 for President, U.S. Senate, and other offices.

- **19 percent** are "somewhat" enthusiastic
- **7 percent** are "not too" enthusiastic
- **5 percent** are "not at all" enthusiastic

When it comes to how Maryland likely voters plan to cast their ballots:

- **43 percent** of likely voters plan to vote in-person on Election Day.
- **28 percent** of likely voters plan to vote in-person before Election Day during the early voting period.
- **27 percent** of likely voters plan to vote by mail by sending in their ballot or by putting it in a designated drop box.
- **3 percent** of likely voters haven't decided how they will cast their ballot.

U.S. Senate Race

If the election for Maryland's U.S. Senate race were held today, **48 percent** of Maryland likely voters would vote for the Democratic candidate Angela Alsobrooks, **39 percent** would vote for the Republican candidate Larry Hogan, and **6 percent** would vote for some other candidate. **Five percent** of likely voters are currently undecided.

- **78 percent** of voters who selected a candidate say they are "set" on their choice, while **20 percent** say they "could change their mind."

Both Democratic candidate Angela Alsobrooks and Republican candidate Larry Hogan are viewed more favorably than unfavorably among likely voters:

- **49 percent** of Maryland likely voters have a favorable opinion of Prince George’s County Executive Angela Alsobrooks, **32 percent** have an unfavorable opinion, and **19 percent** don’t know.
 - Among Democratic likely voters: **75 percent** favorable, **12 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Republican likely voters: **10 percent** favorable, **62 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Independent likely voters: **35 percent** favorable, **39 percent** unfavorable
- **53 percent** of Maryland likely voters have a favorable opinion of former Gov. Larry Hogan, **42 percent** have an unfavorable opinion, and **4 percent** don’t know.
 - Among Democratic likely voters: **38 percent** favorable, **57 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Republican likely voters: **71 percent** favorable, **26 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Independent likely voters: **66 percent** favorable, **28 percent** unfavorable

Maryland likely voters who indicated that they plan to cast their ballot for either Larry Hogan or Angela Alsobrooks in the U.S. Senate race were asked to provide the main reason for their support. The open-ended results are categorized below.

Reasons for an Alsobrooks vote:

- Support for and/or positive views toward Alsobrooks, the Democratic Party, or Democratic policies: **46 percent**
- Support for Democratic control of the U.S. Senate: **26 percent**
- Opposition to and/or negative views of Hogan, Republicans, or Republican policies: **12 percent**
- Views toward reproductive rights and abortion: **7 percent**

Reasons for a Hogan vote:

- Support for and/or positive views toward Hogan, the Republican Party, or Republican policies: **84 percent**
- Opposition to and/or negative views of Alsobrooks, the Democratic Party, or Democratic policies: **9 percent**

Maryland likely voters were also asked whether a candidate's position on several issues was a major or critical issue, one among other important issues, or not that important of an issue when determining their vote.

The results below represent a "major or critical issue:"

- Cost of everyday goods and services: **64 percent**
- Crime and public safety: **63 percent**
- Abortion: **57 percent**
- Taxes and government spending: **57 percent**
- Healthcare: **57 percent**
- Gun control: **56 percent**
- Economic development and jobs: **54 percent**
- Immigration: **51 percent**
- Affordability and access to housing: **50 percent**
- Environmental issues: **39 percent**
- Transportation and infrastructure: **33 percent**

Regardless of who Maryland likely voters plan to vote for in the U.S. Senate race, **56 percent** prefer that their senator "compromises to get things done." In contrast, **32 percent** want a senator who "sticks to their principles no matter what." **Eleven percent** say that "it depends."

When asked to consider the outcome of the general election in November from a national perspective, **54 percent** of Maryland likely voters want the Democratic Party to win control of the U.S. Senate, and **32 percent** want the Republican Party to win control. **Ten percent** say they do not care either way who wins control of the U.S. Senate in November.

Question 1

This November, voters will decide on Question 1, a ballot question that would amend the state constitution to include an individual's right to reproductive freedom, which includes access to abortion.

- **69 percent** of likely voters say they will vote for Question 1, i.e., to amend the state constitution to include an individual's right to reproductive freedom.
- **21 percent** of likely voters say they will vote against Question 1.

U.S. Presidential Race

If the election were held today, **57 percent** of Maryland likely voters would vote for the Democratic candidate Kamala Harris, **35 percent** would vote for the Republican candidate Donald Trump, and **5 percent** would vote for some other candidate. **Three percent** of likely voters are currently undecided.

- **58 percent** of Maryland likely voters have a favorable opinion of Vice President Kamala Harris, **41 percent** have an unfavorable opinion, and **1 percent** don't know.
 - Among Democratic likely voters: **87 percent** favorable, **11 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Republican likely voters: **11 percent** favorable, **89 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Independent likely voters: **46 percent** favorable, **50 percent** unfavorable
- **37 percent** of Maryland likely voters have a favorable opinion of former President Donald Trump, **61 percent** have an unfavorable opinion, and **1 percent** don't know.
 - Among Democratic likely voters: **11 percent** favorable, **87 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Republican likely voters: **85 percent** favorable, **13 percent** unfavorable
 - Among Independent likely voters: **40 percent** favorable, **56 percent** unfavorable

Methodology Statement

The UMBC Poll is conducted under the auspices of the UMBC Institute of Politics and is funded by the UMBC College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences.

The UMBC Poll surveyed 1,003 Maryland adults, including 917 registered voters and 863 likely voters, from Monday, September 23, to Saturday, September 28, 2024. The poll was conducted by live interviewers and text-to-web utilizing a dual-frame (landline and cell phone) random sample stratified by county.

- **21 percent** of interviews were conducted via landline telephone.
- **79 percent** of the interviews were conducted via cellular telephone, including **26 percent** that were administered via text-to-web.

Interviews were conducted from 1 to 8 p.m., and interviewers attempted to reach respondents with working phone numbers a maximum of five times. Braun Research provided the sample of telephone numbers and the data collection.

There is a 95 percent probability that the survey results have the following percentage point sampling error from the actual population distribution for any given survey question:

- MOE=**+/-3.1%** for the sample of 1,003 Maryland adults.
- MOE=**+/-3.2%** for the sample of 917 Maryland registered voters.
- MOE=**+/-3.3%** for the sample of 863 Maryland likely voters.

The margin of sampling error is higher for subgroups. The margin of sampling error is not adjusted for design effects. Like all public opinion polls, the UMBC Poll is also subject to sources of non-sampling error such as non-response bias, question-order effects, and question-wording effects. The topline results include the questions as worded in the order in which they were administered to respondents.

Sample Demographics and Weighting

The UMBC Poll data is weighted by gender, age, race, geography, and educational attainment to represent the Maryland adult population targets established by the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) estimates provided by the U.S. Census. Results are in column percentages and may not add up to exactly 100 due to weighting and rounding.

Question design codes

- Bracketed items []: Items in brackets in the questions are administered in a randomized order.
- Probe (p): Response options that include a (p) indicate the use of a probe maneuver to determine a respondent's intensity of expressed opinion.
Example: Do you have a [favorable or unfavorable] opinion of <item>? Would you say very favorable/unfavorable?
- Open-ended: Open-ended questions are those without a defined set of response options.
- Volunteer (v): Response options that include a (v) indicate that the respondent offered a response that was not read to them in the question.

Likely Voters

Q: REGVOTE and **Q: LV** were used to identify registered and likely voters among the sample of 1,003 Maryland adults. To receive **Q: ENTHUSIASM** to **Q: QUESTION 1** respondents must:

- Confirm they are registered to vote at their current address.
- Indicate they are “very likely” or “absolutely certain” to vote in the November 2024 General Election.
